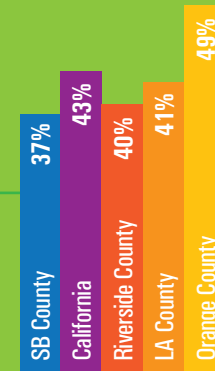
To participate fully in society and the workplace in 2020, citizens will need powerful literacy abilities that until now have been achieved by only a small percentage of the population.

Student Literacy

37% of 3rd-grade students in San Bernardino County met or exceeded the English language arts/literacy standards on the 2016 California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress test, compared to 43% statewide and 40% in Riverside County.



Children who have not developed some basic literacy skills by the time they enter school are 3-4 times more likely to drop out in later years.

Annual cost of low literacy is **\$80 billion** in low productivity, and **\$225 billion** in unemployment benefits, lost taxes, and crime.
