Word from the Sheriff



After nearly 30 years in law enforcement,

it never fails to surprise me how the men and women of this department contribute to our county-wide mission. Every day, the ranks of our safety and professional employees

either lend a helping hand to the community, or remove from our streets and neighborhoods a threat to its well-being. I could not be more proud of my partnership with the men and women who make up this extraordinary law enforcement agency.

Last year was a year of outstanding achievements for us, not the least of which were the implementation of our Project HOPE program, the K-9 program and the opening of HDDC (High Desert Detention Center). The HOPE program shows us the best of community-oriented policing: deputies identify the chronically homeless in their jurisdictions and then – with the help of local citizens and resources – find the best possible solution to that homeless person’s plight, whether it’s raising money for a trip back to loved ones or securing needed medical treatment. The last year also saw the addition of Jojo the bomb-sniffing German shepherd to our “canine arsenal,” which includes our bloodhounds “Dare” and “Deja.” Dare and Deja have proven their ability to find critically missing persons and now we’ll have an added tool for detecting explosives in dangerous situations. The High Desert Detention Center in Adelanto has been expanded to impressive dimensions, with a new total of 2,074 beds. This will help us greatly with the challenges brought about by the realignment of state prisoners. And, among other high water marks too numerous to detail here, our department also took a giant leap into the 21st century by developing a social media presence across many platforms, providing a wealth of vital information for the people we serve.

Beginning 2015, the San Bernardino County Sheriff’s Department has put into action its Four Year Plan, which will continue enhancing our exceptional level of efficiency and success well into the future. I want to build upon the strong

relationships with county government we have forged in the last few years and chart a clear, detailed plan for doing the most with the fiscal resources we have available. No major agency can afford to be purely reactive in times like these and our Four Year Plan will empower us to proactively tackle issues in every field of law enforcement.

In addition, this Sheriff’s Department intends to continue the success it has seen by using the “smart power” of well-informed regional task forces to root out stubborn gang-related crime throughout the county. Gang sweeps, narrowly focused strikes against auto-theft and metal-theft rings, neighborhood “quality of life” enhancement efforts – all these things, and many more, will help us attack systemic crime and degradation in the towns and regions we call home. Along those lines we also plan to work closely with the District Attorney’s Office and other county entities to combat the growing threat of human trafficking, just as we have worked with the District Attorney to help curb truancy in county schools.

Maybe one of the most significant advances in the coming year will be the rollout of social media outreach at the station level – where people are most likely to be interested in city-specific information relevant to their daily lives. Every station will manage its own set of platforms, whether Facebook or Twitter or others, and will be responsible for tailoring its output to best inform the people it protects. When it comes to informing the public, we realize it’s not just a one-way street: the department needs the critical input of every stakeholder in the county. For this reason, we will continue to build on the model of our Information Exchange meetings, expand our availability through frequent community meetings, and provide innovative services like “Text-2-911.”

As we move forward, the men and women of the San Bernardino County Sheriff’s Department will be out there on the streets, deserts and waterways of our county, arresting the bad guys and looking out for the good people. I am honored to be the sheriff of this department, and to have the opportunity to serve and protect this incredibly diverse region. Thank you for that honor.

Community Relations



The Community Liaison Unit is a subdivision of the Public Affairs Division. The Community Liaison Unit is a support unit for specialized and patrol divisions within the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. A major portion of the unit's responsibilities is keeping the Office of the Sheriff and the Executive Staff informed of activities, issues, or events that affect the department and the communities we serve. The unit also represents the department at various meetings and community events throughout the county.

The Community Liaison Unit tracks and monitors current trends, critical and non-critical incidents, and activities on a local and national level that may have a negative or profound impact on the agency or the communities we serve. Each member of the Community Liaison Unit actively seeks to develop a personal, but professional, rapport with local community leaders and representatives, as well as city and county government elected officials. This also includes educational institutes and their leadership, as well as faith-based, business and grass-roots organizations.

The unit has the responsibility of maintaining and managing the Sheriff's Speakers Bureau, which utilizes the vast expertise of personnel from this agency on a wide variety of topics for speaking engagements to various schools and organizations in our county. The Community Liaison Unit is

responsible for the development and implementation of the P.O.S.T. LD-42 curriculum at the Sheriff's Training Facility for all sworn and reserve academies. This block of instruction covers issues that affect law enforcement nationwide, such as cultural awareness and diversity, hate crimes and sexual harassment.

The Community Liaison Unit is also responsible for maintaining a personal rapport with the Sheriff's Information Exchange Committee, which consists of key community, business and faith-based leaders. The Sheriff meets with the Information Exchange Committee on a quarterly basis to discuss current topics and law enforcement incidents that involve issues such as arrests, in-custody deaths, protests, and officer-involved shootings that occur, not only in San Bernardino County, but nationally as well. Additionally, the Unit has been utilized by other local agencies in response to critical incidents in their jurisdiction involving law enforcement use of force issues, hate crimes, rallies, demonstrations and labor issues.

The Community Liaison Unit is vital to the success of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. We continually strive to be progressive and at the forefront of building transparent and positive relationships within the communities we proudly serve.

The Cloud On Our Horizon



Traditionally, the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department has used an in-house data center to manage IT computing resources (this is known as managing servers and other resources "on-premises"). Over the last several years, there has been a shift to cloud-based services. Such a changeover allows the Sheriff's Department to simplify its view of IT and transfer the burden of managing hardware and software updates to organizations that host those cloud servers and services. The Sheriff's Department chose Microsoft as its partner, because they took the necessary steps to ensure it met the same industry standards we have to as a law enforcement organization.

Since Microsoft manages the server and storage infrastructure, we can now focus on providing messaging, collaboration and real-time communication services to our end-users, rather than being burdened with a significant IT management load.

This allows the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department to realize the following benefits:

- Reduction in overall staff hours required to support the e-mail system, communication, and document sharing and storage; this increases the availability of resources for other projects
- Reduction in storage requirements for our on-premise e-mail and document systems, thus reducing overall costs

- Reduction in server hardware requirements to support on-premise e-mail, communication, document sharing and storage systems

Utilizing Microsoft's Office 365, we no longer need to maintain physical or virtual environments over long periods of time and we do not need to personally manage required patching cycles. All Office 365 applications (Exchange, SharePoint, Lync and Office) are kept up to date through the latest patches and hotfixes, as well as with the latest major versions of the products involved.

Our own resources — which is to say, the Sheriff's Department's resources — for monitoring, securing and reacting to disruptions in service, are significantly less than those of an organization like Microsoft, whose reputation depends on their proactive, real-time approach to these challenges.

Because of this massive shift in how the department handles its "e-business," we won't have to purchase on-site digital storage space that we may or may not use in the future. Additionally, the problem of accommodating ever-increasing loads of e-mail and document storage is eliminated. All in all, the move to "The Cloud" is timely, hugely cost-effective, convenient and goes a long way to prevent future headaches.

Crime Lab



The original Crime Lab building was constructed in the late 1960s as a water testing laboratory for another county department. When this operation closed in 1982, the Crime Laboratory moved into this building from the old Courthouse.

In 1986, an addition was constructed adjacent to the Laboratory building to house Cal-ID, Central Evidence and Property, the Photo Lab and the division's clerical and administrative offices.

According to the 2007 Needs Assessment Study, the current facility is 35,521 square feet in size. This includes about 12,000 square feet in the Property warehouse and 6,000 square feet in two modular buildings that house the Firearms/Toolmarks Unit and the Forensic Biology office space. Excluding these, the building has 17,521 square feet of office and lab space.

When the lab moved from the Courthouse in 1982, it had a staff of less than 15 employees. We now have 67 positions with 61 of them currently staffed.

Essentially, as staffing levels grew in response to increased requests for service, space became tight. To remedy this, Cal-ID relocated to leased space on Mill Street and two modular buildings were added to the parking lot. It is our plan to eliminate these trailers when the new building is complete and the existing building renovated.

In 2013, a Request for Proposal was issued to obtain the services of an architectural firm to design the new Laboratory annex. After an extensive review

of their project experience, and on-site interviews of the architectural teams, the design work for the new building was awarded to a team headed by LPA, Inc. LPA engaged the services of McClaren, Wilson & Lawrie, and an experienced crime lab design firm, to assist with the planning. The staff of the Criminalistics Laboratory worked closely with the LPA/MWL team over a period of nine months to design the new lab and office space.

A groundbreaking ceremony was held on October 28, 2014 for the new 20,000 square foot Laboratory annex to be constructed immediately to the west of the current Property and Evidence warehouse. The Sheriff, members of the Board of Supervisors, Executive Staff members, Scientific Investigations Division personnel and other interested department employees celebrated the start of construction of the new building, which had been in the planning stages for over ten years.

On October 7, 2014, the Board of Supervisors awarded AMG Associates, Inc. a contract for the construction of the new annex. Construction began in early November 2014 and is expected to be completed in November 2015. This new addition will provide laboratory space and offices for the Controlled Substances, Forensic Alcohol, Crime Scene Investigation and Firearms/Toolmarks Units. Upon occupancy of the new building, the current Laboratory will be renovated to provide increased laboratory and office space for the Forensic Biology and Trace Analysis Units.

Keeping Our Streets Safe



In March of 2014, the Sheriff's Specialized Investigations Division began to see an increase in Murders/Attempt Murders and Carjacking crimes throughout the cities of San Bernardino and Highland. During the initial investigation into these crimes, it was found to be rival gang violence between Blood and Crip gangs within the County of San Bernardino, specifically the Tre Roc Mafia and California Gardens Crips and Delmann Heights Bloods. Investigators found that because of the intimidation factor achieved by these violent street gangs, witnesses and victims were reluctant to provide any information to investigators.

In an attempt to combat the violence, an investigative team was formed in September of 2014. The team consisted of investigators from the Sheriff's Specialized Investigations Division, the Specialized Enforcement Division, the Criminal Intelligence Division, San Bernardino County Highland Station, the San Bernardino Police Department, San Bernardino County Probation, California Highway Patrol and the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Numerous crimes involving violence were solved during this operation. Of the 33 arrests, three of those

were for Murder; 29 counts of Attempted Murder, 16 counts of Conspiracy or Solicitation to Commit Murder and two counts of Accessory to Murder. Many robberies, carjackings and drive-by shootings were solved. About 30 firearms were recovered, including an AK-47, several Glock handguns and numerous high capacity magazines. A variety of narcotics were seized: ecstasy, methamphetamine, marijuana and crack cocaine.

The success of this operation was a direct result of the exemplary work and perseverance displayed by the investigators involved. Such a colossal objective could not have been accomplished without the professional investigative skills exhibited by the investigators during the course of the aforementioned operation.

Although law enforcement officers continue to strive toward bringing an end to the daily violence perpetrated by gangs within our communities, the personnel involved in this operation demonstrated to our citizens that each of the involved agencies is devoted to keeping our streets safe.

High Desert Detention Center



The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department's High Desert Detention Center (HDDC) expansion project was completed in January of 2014. As a result, it added 1,392 beds, bringing its total bed capacity to 2,098. Sitting on seven and a half acres, the hi-tech facility's enlargement has a total price-tag of \$144 million, with a proportionately hefty contribution predicted to the tax rolls of Adelanto, Victorville, Hesperia, and other surrounding communities.

At the present time there are 214 employees at HDDC, with a payroll of \$17 million. The facility will be staffed in three phases. Once fully staffed HDDC will have approximately 408 employees. Complete build-out and full staffing is expected sometime in the 2017/2018 fiscal year.

Between February of 2014 and January of 2015, the HDDC witnessed 14,802 bookings. The average daily inmate population is 918 persons.

HDDC continues to provide a tremendous measure of efficiency and service for both the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department and for inmates as well, because the presence of the facility eliminates the need for deputies to travel to Rancho Cucamonga to book inmates with medical conditions. Such technological advancements at HDDC as specially coated walls to reduce the spread

of infectious diseases, and an onsite dental facility equipped with two stations and an X-ray suite, make it possible to reduce costs associated with inmate health care. They also drastically reduce prisoner travel time and deputy man-hours spent in transit. Instead of transporting sick inmates down the hill, deputies are now able to stay in the High Desert and get back to their assigned area to provide proactive patrolling. Inmates with common conditions like high blood pressure or diabetes are now routinely monitored and treated "in house."

Funding for the expansion of HDDC was made possible by state monies designated for the construction and expansion of detention facilities as authorized in AB 900. Passed in 2007, AB 900 provided funding for jail and prison projects to reduce overcrowding through the various county jails and the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation's prisons. San Bernardino County received a \$100 million AB 900 grant to fund the expansion project. The expansion came just in time to deal with AB 109, a law which shifted the responsibility of housing some state prisoners from the state to the county, in order to comply with a federal mandate regarding prison overcrowding. Governor Brown signed the bill into law in 2011, a move that quickly became known as "Realignment." As a result, sheriff's departments throughout California have been required to house inmates who normally would have been sent to state prison.

Other technological highpoints in the design of HDDC include a hi-tech video surveillance system and "video visitation," which allows inmates a greater chance to visit with family members without all the intra-facility movement of the past: less inmate movement results in a safer detention center. Also, a wide variety of rehabilitative programs and services are available, which can now be conducted in classes directly within the housing units, again reducing inmate movement.
