WORD from the **SHERIFF**



Since being elected Sheriff this past year, I can honestly say that I am truly honored to be leading one of the best and most progressive departments in the nation. I am proud of the accomplishments made this past year by the wonderful men and women of the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department.

As all of you know, the economic climate has continued to deteriorate, hitting our region of the country particularly hard. The Sheriff's Department has not been spared and in the upcoming year will continue to have to deal with these significant budget issues.

In spite of the economic challenges we faced, we will continue to provide quality and effective law enforcement services to the residents of our county while continuing to achieve our strategic goals. Without a doubt, we would not be able to accomplish what we do without the talented men and women who work for this organization. Many of the changes that were implemented this last year were a direct result of the financial challenges we are facing and resulted in significant cost savings. Some of these ideas came from line-level personnel. Some commands within the department became "dual commands" with oversight for two stations or divisions being managed by one sheriff's captain. In our patrol operations we transitioned to 12-hour shifts, eliminating overlap and we believe increasing efficiency. This realignment in patrol allowed us to transfer 50 deputies

back to corrections in an effort to reduce overtime. Additionally, the Executive Staff has identified internal positions both safety and professional that can be transferred as vacancies arise in lieu of hiring.

In the past year this department – in spite of fiscal constraints – has established itself as a go-to source for expertise on developing issues like cyberbullying and sexting, has cut fingerprint identification times in the field, taken the lead statewide on the issue of human trafficking, and maintained a high level of morale in a very challenging environment.

In the upcoming year we must continue to think of innovative ways to provide services while being mindful of costs and spending. So with this in mind, I challenge each of the 3272 members of this department to present cost-saving ideas to their respective commands.

It will be my continuing pledge to the citizens of this county to strive for our department to be as cost-effective with taxpayer dollars as it is possible to be.

As your elected sheriff, I take great pride in leading this organization and providing quality law enforcement services to the citizens of San Bernardino County. And I am grateful for this honor and the opportunity to lead this department.

PEACE OFFICER MEMORIAL


In 1962, President John F. Kennedy, wishing to honor the sacrifices made by law enforcement, proclaimed May 15th the first Peace Officers' Memorial Day. It was the first such national observance. 1977 saw the creation of a Peace Officers' Monument in Sacramento, California.

The San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department took the next step, by building the Frank Bland Memorial in 1988. This shrine to valor was built to honor both Sheriff Bland and the members of his Department killed in the line of duty. Sheriff Bland was an FBI agent, the Police Chief of Needles for eight years, and Sheriff of San Bernardino County from 1954 to 1982. He was elected Sheriff an unparalleled seven times.

On May 26, 2010, a tearful ceremony took place at the Bland Memorial. On that date we remembered our own fallen heroes. We also honored their families, and vowed that we would never forget the men and women who had worn the badge, and who had made the secure days of our respective pasts possible.

In years gone by, this event has sometimes been an unveiling ceremony, as the name and badge of a deputy killed in the line of duty is added to the monument. I am thankful that, with the exception of one deputy from over fifty-one years ago, we have not had to add a name to the Bland Memorial since 2005.

All such memorials are meant to be reminders that our security does not come without a cost. It is a terrible price, but there are those who are willing to pay it. Peace officers risk all they have in the line of duty, so that our lives may be a little safer, and our homes a little more secure. And when one of them is killed, all of us are affected by the loss, whether we know it or not. Many of us do indeed feel the loss quite deeply, and quite painfully. Because to us, these men and women were, at one time, and forever, in our family.



SPECIAL DEPUTY *for a* DAY | Raul GUZMAN

For as long as he could remember, Raul Guzman had wanted to be a law enforcement officer. It was his life's dream. So as soon as he was allowed to, Raul became a member of the Fontana Explorer Post #513, and, for the next eight months, pursued his dream of being a cop.


One day Raul was working out with weights and noticed a pain in his right shoulder. The pain would not go away and Raul was taken for x-rays, and then to a specialist. A biopsy was taken and on October 17, 2008, he was diagnosed with Osteosarcoma bone cancer. Several surgeries ensued and then Raul found himself, thankfully, in remission. But doctors informed him that his dream of being a law enforcement officer would not come true.

At that point the Debbie Chisholm Memorial Foundation (DCMF) and the San Bernardino Safety Employees Benefit Association (SEBA) stepped in to make Raul's dream come true, at least for a short period of time.

On Tuesday, April 27, 2010, Raul Guzman was sworn in as a Special "Deputy for a Day" by Sheriff Rod Hoops. Family, friends and several Explorers arrived at Sheriff's Headquarters in support of Raul. Following the swearing in ceremony in the Sheriff's Office, Raul was transported by

limousine to the Range, where he experienced a live fire and dynamic entry demonstration by the Sheriff's SWAT Team. The Bombs/Arson Division demonstrated explosive ordinance by exploding a scrapped vehicle. Bombs/ Arson also put its robot and K-9 through their paces for the stricken youngster. Raul tested his handgun skills using a Shooting Simulator at the Academy. Then Raul was taken to EVOC, where he rode in a patrol car on the Performance Track. Raul also enjoyed a helicopter ride with Sheriff's Aviation and was flown to the Fontana Station, where a BBQ lunch was held in his honor.

But sadly, after a courageous battle against his disease, Raul passed away on August 10, 2010. He will be missed by all of us who were touched by this brave young man's dedication to the law enforcement profession.

The New *HESPERIA* STATION

Thanks to the proactive efforts of the city leaders in Hesperia, the Sheriff's Hesperia Station has (after 21 years at two separate sites not designed for law enforcement) found a brand new home.

On Monday, October 4th, 2010, Sheriff Rod Hoops, along with Captain Lance Clark, Hesperia Station Commander, and several local, county and national dignitaries, opened Hesperia's new state of the art law enforcement facility. The new 43,000 sq. feet facility includes a 45-person briefing room, break room, executive conference room, and multi-purpose room, in addition to the 195-person community room -- all to assist the 52 employees and 75 volunteers in the completion of their duties. The facility also has three 110 lb. ice makers, as well as all resources necessary to store and maintain the station's command post.

In 1989, Hesperia incorporated as a city, contracting for law enforcement services with the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department. The frugal and far-sighted civic leaders could see that the growing needs of the sheriff and his troops would require a new and expanded home base, and all the right steps were taken accordingly.

Our new, built-from-scratch facility was designed to reach capacity in 20-30 years, and can be expanded an additional 10,000 sq. feet if needed. In their off time employees can work out in the custom-equipped gym. The front lobby is protected by a concrete and steel vehicle barrier decorated as an outside seating area,

as well as by 1" thick Plexiglas separating the front desk clerk from the lobby.

In addition to an extensive report-writing room, there is a large evidence packaging room and evidence locker area. The facility has more than 200 parking stalls in the secured parking lot and numerous exterior cameras. The covered patrol unit parking structure also supports part of the solar panel system. The solar system is the first of its kind for the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, and will produce 60% or more of the electricity needed to run the facility.

Sheriff Hoops and his Executive Staff are extremely grateful to the visionary leadership of Hesperia for providing law enforcement with a tremendous boost in its crime-fighting ventures in the high desert.



45 MILLION DOLLAR NARCOTICS SEIZURE

“This is one of the largest seizures in the county and I will make every effort to continue this aggressive fight against drug traffickers entering San Bernardino County.”

That was the verdict of Sheriff Rod Hoops on his department wrapping up a mammoth drug bust last June. This seizure reveals both the scope of the drug problem and the commitment of the Sheriff’s Department to eradicate it.

Responding to changes in the severity, complexity and intensity of narcotic-related crimes within our county, the Narcotics Division has organized part of its resources into numerous teams, which conduct street, mid-level and high-level investigations in assigned geographical areas. One of these teams is the Regional Methamphetamine Task Force (RMTF).

The RMTF was established in 1996 due to a major influx of methamphetamine manufactured and transported throughout the county. In the beginning of 2010, an extensive investigation by the RMTF revealed a large scale drug trafficking organization. This investigation led to a traffic stop conducted on Wednesday, June 23, 2010, at 11:00 a.m., by Sheriff’s HICIT, on a tractor/trailer that was traveling eastbound on Interstate 10. After making contact with the driver, 32 year old Fernando Luevano, the deputy found that the paperwork for the load was not in order. Luevano gave deputies consent to search the vehicle and upon opening the trailer, the deputies noticed an overwhelming odor of marijuana. A further search of the trailer found pallets full of illegal narcotics.

Deputies took possession of the tractor/trailer and found it was filled to capacity with large cardboard containers, which held thousands of heat-sealed packages of narcotics. Investigators seized approximately 38,000 pounds of marijuana, 2,700 pounds of cocaine and 67 pounds of methamphetamine, valued at \$45,000,000.

Fernando Luevano was arrested and booked at Central Detention Center for Possession, Transportation and Sales of Narcotics. His bail was set at \$5,000,000.

Sometimes it seems as though law enforcement’s “alphabet soup” of outfits might lead to confusion; but as this case shows, our multitude of details and organizations work together seamlessly to bring down even the biggest criminal operations.
