

Introduction

A Whole Lot to do About Something

State law requires that jurisdictions throughout the State divert 50% of the solid waste they generate from the landfills. Some San Bernardino County communities are below the 50% diversion goal, while others fight to remain above it. Construction and demolition material has been targeted for diversion by the County of San Bernardino because of the significant amounts of debris generated by the construction industry. If diversion rates do not reach or stay above 50%, State fines could be as high as \$10,000 per day, for each day of violation.

Construction and demolition (C&D) are materials generated in the construction and demolition of buildings, roads, homes, tenant improvements, landscaping, hardscaping, and site clearing activities. This waste stream includes, but is not limited to: concrete, asphalt, gypsum, wood waste, glass, ferrous and non-ferrous metals, red clay brick, corrugated cardboard, soils, trees, and shrubs. This guide provides information on reducing, reusing, and recycling the volume of construction and demolition materials at the source.

Extending The Life of Our Landfills

Available landfill space in San Bernardino County is decreasing. As mentioned above, the State of California enacted legislation requiring that localities reduce the amount of waste they send to landfills. To reach this goal, it is essential that the C&D waste stream be managed through source reduction, reuse, and recycling efforts. Fortunately, there can be considerable cost savings to contractors who reduce or recycle these materials. These savings will increase as landfill capacity diminishes and disposal costs increase in the coming years. As of yet there are no ordinances regarding the recycling of C&D debris for the County of San Bernardino. However, beginning January 1, 2011, the State of California will require all new buildings in the state to follow the CA Green Building Standards. CALGREEN will require a 20% reduction in water use, a 50% diversion rate for construction and demolition waste and installation of low polluting/emitting materials. San Bernardino County operates the Comprehensive Disposal Site Diversion Program (CDSDP) at most County disposal sites. The objective of the program is to increase recycling efforts in response to the state-mandated waste reduction goals. Residential and commercial customers are charged an additional fee to have their loads reviewed and recyclables sorted and diverted from the waste stream. Items that are diverted include: wood/green wastes, tires, concrete, metal and other C&D materials. Remember to let the scale house know that you need diversion receipts for your project to stay in compliance with your construction waste management plan.

Conserving Our Natural Resources

C&D materials can be recycled into a number of useful products. Concrete and asphalt wastes are crushed for use as aggregate base in road construction; metal can be sold as scrap to processors for recycling. Wood and green wastes can be used for soil amendment; good quality red clay brick is marketed by building materials companies; and corrugated cardboard can be recycled into new cardboard packaging. All of these recycling efforts help to conserve natural resources, one of the primary goals of resource recovery.

Beginning a C&D Recycling Program

The first step in recycling your C&D waste materials is to pre-assess the amounts and composition of your waste; the time frame in which materials will be generated; and the amount of space available for separation of materials at the site. With this information, you can begin to determine what wastes will be generated and if the quantities will be significant enough to warrant source separation. Depending on the availability of storage and hauling, decisions can be made as to those materials to separate out from the mixed wastes. Of course, the more materials that are eliminated from the mixed wastes, the more money you can save.

Reducing Your Waste Hauling & Disposal Costs

If your C&D materials are currently being sent to the landfill, your disposal costs may be unnecessarily high. The tipping fees for concrete and asphalt at San Bernardino County operated landfills, for example, currently average about \$55 per ton. Tipping fees at concrete and asphalt recycling facilities can be as low as \$10 per ton. Your company may be able to save money through avoided disposal costs and receive revenues from the sale of presorted materials such as scrap metal and cardboard.

The cost of transporting materials to recycling processors may be a concern to contractors. Trucking and transportation costs may range from \$65.00 and up per hour each way. As shown in this listing guide, San Bernardino County has many recycling facilities, some of which are located close to County landfills. Contractors can make arrangements to have bins provided and have C&D materials source separated and hauled from construction sites. There are processing firms that will provide on-site crushers for recycling and reuse of concrete and asphalt, which may reduce hauling and disposal fees. Waste haulers may offer special services, at reduced fees, for source-separated construction material.



Some materials can be separated and reused in their existing form at the site or by other businesses and organizations. By participating in a materials exchange, a company can improve its bottom line: reducing disposal fees and saving money. This may require some advanced planning. There are several organizations that may be able to reuse your unwanted materials:

Deconstruction

In terms of building and construction, deconstruction is the dismantlement of building components to be reused on site or recycled at another construction site. This is also known as reverse construction and differs from demolition because the materials are sorted and reused in the construction of a new building instead of being landfilled or recycled into new products. The materials involved in deconstruction now have a new life in the new building being built.

Demolition is a quick and inexpensive way to take down a structure though it generates a lot of waste that increases the cost of a project through transportation costs. By deconstructing a building and reusing it onsite, the project reduces their transportation and disposal costs reduces their need for virgin materials and can even reduce the cost of purchasing new materials because the old materials still have value.

Mandatory Commercial Recycling

Assembly Bill 341, signed into law on October 6, 2011, started the ball rolling to implement mandatory commercial recycling for all businesses (including public entities) who generate 4 or more cubic yards of waste a week or multi-family residential dwellings of 5 units or more beginning July 1, 2012. The purpose of this law is to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by diverting commercial solid waste through recycling and expanding opportunities for additional recycling services and manufacturing in California. If your construction project falls under the requirements of this law, you will be required to incorporate a recycling program on site and provide recycling information to the County of San Bernardino. This can either

be done through the franchise haulers, employee volunteers or by donating/selling your recyclables to an outside recycling vendor. Please note that the County does have exclusive franchise haulers and paying for trash or recycling services when a franchise hauler holds a contract is a violation of County Code Title 4, Division 6, Chapter 5, Section 46.0501.

Non-Residential Land Clearing Debris

As per the CalGreen Building Codes, all non-residential construction projects must divert 100% of their excavated soil and land clearing debris including but limited to trees, stumps, rocks, and associated vegetation and soils to a diversion site or reused onsite (Section 5.408.4).

Habitat for Humanity – San Bernardino Area

A non-profit organization, Habitat for Humanity uses volunteer labor and donated materials to build and rehabilitate housing for low-income families and sells them at cost. This organization relies heavily on donations for its building supplies, and often is in need of a wide variety of construction materials. For example, plywood and dimensional lumber are greatly needed. Habitat for Humanity has limited storage space, moves from site to site, and must comply with strict building codes; any donations must be pre-approved and arranged with the organization in advance. Amor Ministries

A non-profit, non-denominational organization, that organizes short-term mission trips to Mexico to build and repair homes, churches, schools, medical clinics, and orphanages. Waste Prevention is more important than recycling. Why? Practices that prevent the generation of waste, such as reusing products on-site and reducing packaging, minimize material use and expenses. The littlest changes to building practices can add up to significant savings for the environment and the builder.



Starting a Program

Managing C&D Waste: Checklist

- ★ **Conduct An Informal Waste Assessment** – Determine the amounts, types, and time frame for C&D materials generated by your project. Calculate any possible cost savings from reducing a portion of this waste stream, in terms of disposal cost avoidance and transportation time.
- ★ **Reduce** – Investigate strategies for reducing C&D waste materials. Proper materials management practices can result in cost savings. Assure that precise estimates are made prior to cutting materials so that excess scrap and end cuts can be avoided. Consider having materials pre-cut at lumber yards, using engineered wood products, steel framing, or other pre-manufactured components.
- ★ **Reuse** – Consider the potential for others to use the materials you normally discard. Consider planning ahead and contacting a non-profit donation center such as Armor Industries or Habitat for Humanity to arrange donation or visit CalMax at www.calrecycle.ca.gov/calmax/ to list such materials (see insert for contact information). Conduct site pre-assessment to evaluate the kinds of materials that can be salvaged for reuse, such as cabinets, architectural woodwork, light fixtures, and appliances. Visit www.decon-network.org for more information on deconstruction methods.
- ★ **Recycle** – Investigate the companies listed in this guide or local telephone book yellow pages (under recycle) that can recycle some of your C&D wastes from both source-separated and mixed loads. Be sure to compare the costs of recycling with the costs of disposal.
- ★ **Educate Employees, Contractors, & Sub-Contractors** – Whatever waste reduction strategies you choose, remember that it is crucial to educate and motivate your employees and subcontractors for maximum participation. Emphasize that source reduction, reuse, and recycling is everybody's business.

Turn Trash into Treasure

Before and during construction, take a proactive role to reduce disposal costs by finding "dollars in your dumpster." The County of San Bernardino has developed infrastructure for recycling construction materials such as asphalt, concrete, drywall, cardboard, metals, and wood.

Making Your Program Work

Recycling construction materials saves money by cutting disposal costs. It reduces waste going to the landfill and attracts clients who value environmental responsibility. Other benefits include a cleaner, safer site and improved community relations. Follow these steps to set up a successful, cost-effective job-site recycling program.

Tip

Before actually collecting recyclables, call ahead to the processor to make sure they take the materials or any restrictions.



How can you find space to separate recyclables on space-constrained sites?

Start Early---Incorporate recycling early on to guarantee success.

- ★ Choose smaller containers and more frequent collection. There are a variety of container sizes and service options available through recycling service providers.
- ★ Ask recycling service providers about single containers with multiple compartments.
- ★ Rent a trailer for major recyclable material generated in the first phase of construction. When full, haul it directly to the recycler. Bring it back to collect the next quantity of material generated.
- ★ Use smaller containers, on wheels if possible. That are collected at the end of the day and dumped into a larger container for pick up.
- ★ If self-hauling, build custom containers to fit the space requirements using scrap or damaged plywood, concrete forms, or barrier fencing.
- ★ Use trashcans and other small containers to collect recyclables generated in smaller amounts.
- ★ Consider co-mingling small quantities of wood, cardboard, and metals to make on large load of recyclables.
- ★ Office Recycling – consider setting up a paper recycling and beverage container recycling in offices on site.

Research Recycling Options

Using a **commercial hauler** works well on projects where large quantities of materials are generated, such as demolition, multifamily, and commercial projects. Some recyclers offer smaller drop off boxes or drop boxes with several compartments for home construction and tenant improvement projects.

Self-hauling is a good choice for projects where small quantities of materials are generated, such as residential construction and remodeling. Recyclable materials are collected on-site in piles or temporary containers and taken to recycling facilities in the contractor's own vehicles.

- ★ For commercial collection, determine if you will co-mingle recyclables or source-separate them for collection.
- ★ Reusing materials on-site such as chipping landclearing debris for mulch or erosion control, and grinding concrete and asphalt for fill, are inexpensive recycling options.

Source separated or co-mingled, which is best for your project?

Source separated recycling service involves collecting recyclables in separate containers as they are generated. The recycling hauler takes the materials directly to a recycler or a transfer site.

Co-mingled recycling service allows contractors to put select recyclables such as wood, cardboard, and metals in one container. The recycling company takes the materials to a sorting facility where the materials are separated for recycling. Some services will be mixed loads that include garbage.

PROS & CONS The recycling rate on co-mingled programs can be significantly lower than source separated programs. It is also challenging to quantify the amount of materials recycled on a particular project. Co-mingled recycling is cheaper than garbage disposal but source-separated recycling saves more money.



HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL FOR SMALL BUSINESSES

WHAT IS A CESQG?

Businesses that generate 27 gallons or 220 lbs. of hazardous waste, or 2.2 lbs. of extremely hazardous waste per month are called “Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generators,” or CESQGs. San Bernardino County Household Hazardous Program provides waste management services to CESQG businesses. The most common CESQGs in San Bernardino County are painters, print shops, auto shops, builders, agricultural operators and property managers, but there are many others. When you call, be ready to describe the types and amounts of waste your business generates in a typical month. If you generate hazardous waste on a regular basis, you must:




- * Register with San Bernardino County Fire Department (909) 386-8401 as a hazardous waste generator.
- * To obtain an EPA ID# and application form from the State visit www.dtsc.ca.gov.
- * Manage hazardous waste in accordance with all applicable local, state and federal laws and regulations.

How Do I GET SERVICE?

To arrange an appointment for the CESQG Program, call 1-800-645-9228 or 909-382-5401. Be ready to describe the type and amount of hazardous waste your business is ready to dispose of, and the types and size(s) of containers that the waste is in.



PROGRAMS FOR SMALL BUSINESSES



Why is the Fire Department Collecting Hazardous Waste?

Small Quantity Generators often have difficulty disposing of small quantities of hazardous waste. Hazardous waste companies usually have a minimum amount of waste that they will pick up, or charge a minimum fee for service. Typically, the minimum fee exceeds the cost of disposal for the hazardous waste. This leaves the small quantity generator in a difficult situation. Some respond by storing hazardous waste until it becomes economical for the hazardous waste transporter to pick it up, putting the business out of compliance by exceeding regulatory accumulation time limits. Other businesses simply store their hazardous wastes indefinitely, creating an unsafe work environment and exceeding accumulation time limits. Yet other businesses attempt to illegally dispose of their waste at household hazardous waste collection facilities. These facilities are not legally permitted to accept commercial wastes, nor are prepared to provide legal documentation for commercial hazardous waste disposal. In answer to the problems identified above, the San Bernardino County



Fire Department Household Hazardous Program instituted the Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generator Program.

PAYMENT FOR SERVICES

The CESQG Program will prepare an invoice for your business at the time of service. You can pay at the time of service with cash or a check, or you can mail your payment to the Fire Department within 30 days. Please note that we do not accept credit card payments. The preferred method of payment is to handle payment at time of service. Additional charges may apply for accounts not paid within 30 days.



ARE THERE ANY OTHER WAYS THAT I CAN SAVE MONEY ON HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL?

Yes! First, start by reducing the amount of waste that you produce by changing processes or process chemicals, at your business. Next, examine if there is a way that you can recycle your waste back into your processes.



Network with similar businesses or trade associations for waste minimization and pollution prevention solutions.

WHAT IF YOUR BUSINESS DOES NOT QUALIFY?

Call the San Bernardino County Fire Department Field Services Division for assistance with hazardous waste management at 909-386-8401. If you reduce the amount of waste you generate each month to 27 gallons or less, you may qualify in the future.



WHAT HAPPENS TO YOUR HAZARDOUS WASTE?

Hazardous waste collected by the CESQG Program is transported to a state permitted processing facility in San Bernardino. The waste is further processed at this point and packaged for off-site recycling (oil filters, oil, latex paint, antifreeze, and batteries) or destructive incineration (pesticides, corrosives, flammables, oil based paint).





WASTE TYPE AND COST

There is a small handling fee involved in the collection of hazardous waste from your business. Disposal costs depend on the type of waste.
